WHO DOES WHAT?

In our world today, we hear many people talking about the way to heaven. For those of us who have been fortunate to hear God's Word proclaimed in truth and purity, we can quickly respond that we are saved through faith in Christ Jesus. That faith is a gift to us by our Gracious Lord.

That is made clear in the following passage: "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast." (Ephesians 2:8-9)

One of the things most of us have is the abundance of messages about Jesus on our televisions, our tablets and our smart phones. We also hear messages in hymns and songs. Living in an age that promotes the Ecumenical movement, a common response for most of us is to listen or look for the name Jesus in these messages.

It is indeed important to listen for a reference to Jesus since we know that it is only through Jesus that we can be saved. (See Acts 4:12) However, it is important that we listen to just how the name of Jesus is used. Dr. Norman Nagel reminds us that simple grammar is important. He asks, "Who is driving the verbs?" He points out that there is a difference between a message that says "I love Jesus" and one that says "Jesus loves me."

"More Than Enough Room"

Acts 4:12 - And there is salvation in no one else, for there is no other Name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved.

By the Act of March 1, 1872, Congress began what would become the National Park Service.

This it did by carving out chunks of Montana and Wyoming to make Yellowstone National Park. The law said it wanted this area to be "a public park or pleasuring ground for the benefit and enjoyment of the people" and placed it "under exclusive control of the Secretary of the Interior."

A pleasuring ground for everyone sounds like a crackerjack idea, and it is.

The only problem with that line of thinking is this: in 2017 there are a lot more *everyones* than there was in 1872. Just as significantly, the numerous everyones of 2017 can travel farther and faster to see these national parks than could their ancestors.

And those two facts, my friends, can make for an overcrowding problem.

Indeed, for the first time in the U.S. National Park System's history, there is a movement to use a reservation system to limit the number of people going into some of the parks at any given time. The first park on that list is Zion in Utah. Last year 4.3 million people surged into that bit of beauty -- most of those visitors confining themselves to the park's main canyon.

Those who study the park say it's too much of a good thing and must be limited.

You know, we Christians ought to be very thankful. By midnight on the first Pentecost there were only a few thousand believers. Put all those people together and you've got a small town. Today, 21 centuries later, there is an estimated 2.2 billion believers in the world, and Christianity is the single largest movement in the world's history.

Now 2.2 billion people would destroy the infrastructure of the world's most far-sighted municipality. Thankfully, those numbers cause no problem for the Lord. Think about it:

- 1. God loved the world and every person who would ever live in it.
- 2. God sent His Son to carry the sins of -- and die for -- every sinner.
- 3. God would have all men to be saved and come to a knowledge of the truth.
- 4. Jesus, the perfect Savior, has gone to prepare a place for every person whose name is written in the Lord's Book of Life.

In short, Daily Devotioner, as long as your faith is in good shape, you don't have to worry about whether there is going to be room in heaven for you.

That's the good news. The bad news is that the world today holds 7.5 billion people, and that means there are 5.3 billion people who aren't headed for heaven. That means two out of every three people you see aren't going through the pearly gates.

And that's a shame because the Lord has done everything necessary to bring them home.

It's time for us to help.

THE PRAYER: Dear Lord, You sent Your Son to seek and save the lost. I was once one of those lost, but now I have been found. Although I cannot reach out to 5.3 billion people by myself, use me to share the Savior's story of salvation with the lost around me. In Jesus' Name I pray. Amen.

Stewardship

"Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might" (Eccl. 9:10).

God bids us to be faithful in the tasks He calls us to do. He calls us to be members of a family (husbands and wives; fathers and mothers; sons and daughters). He calls us to be members of society (those who govern and those who are governed). And He calls us to be members of His family, the Church (those who preach and teach and those who hear and learn). Each of these callings from God places a duty on us.

As members of a family, husbands are given the duty to die for their wives as Christ gave His life for His bride, the Church; while wives are given the duty to respect their husbands and submit themselves to them as the Church does to Christ. Fathers and mothers are to raise their children in the fear and admonition of the Lord, teaching them the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Scriptures concerning Baptism, Confession, the Office of the Keys, and the Lord's Supper. Children are to honor their parents throughout their lives, and even when their parents are no longer alive, serving and obeying them, loving and cherishing them, and speaking well of them.

As members of society, God calls those who govern to bear the sword, that is, to punish those who do evil those who live contrary to God's will—and to reward those who do good—those whose lives are lived in conformity with God's will. Those who are governed are to obey their leaders as to the Lord Himself, for their leaders bear the sword of God's temporal justice for a purpose.

As members of God's own family, the Church, He calls those who preach and teach to do so in faithfulness to His holy Word. To preach and teach the Law of God to convict the hearts of hearers of their sin and to encourage, admonish, and exhort them to do good works in accordance with God's will. They are to preach and teach the Gospel, the full forgiveness of their sins accomplished by Christ and received through faith, not by works. They are to administer the means of grace in accordance with the Gospel and the Word of God. They do all this for the young and old alike, for those who are near and far off. Those who hear and learn are to submit themselves to their preachers and teachers. They are to support them by their prayers and their gifts.

Each of these callings from God places a duty on us. They make a claim on our presence, our prayers, and on our time, talents, and treasures. So, "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might" (Eccl 9:10). Pray for your family, for your government, and your church. Give of yourself by means of your time, your talents, and your treasures to your family, your government, and your Church. That is what it means to be faithful in the tasks that God has given us. That is what it means to do it with all your might.

MISSION LUTHERAN CHURCH Council Meeting June 20, 2017

President Greg Fant called the meeting to order at 6:32 p.m. Attending were Greg Fant, John Guenther, Beth Fant, Megan Wood, Robert Scaling, Dianne Wensel, Frank Brennan, Doug Lorenz, Ruth Staffeldt, Jan Peyton, and guest, Carol Moore. Doug Lorenz led devotion and prayer based on Exodus chapter 19, verses 3-6.

Minutes of the May 16, 2017, meeting were approved as emailed with the addition of Jerry Stickles to the list of attendees.

<u>Elders' Report</u>: see attached report submitted by Doug Lorenz. John Guenther asked if Mission could keep three Hispanic Bibles and hymnals for use by our congregation and Doug concurred. Doug noted that Dr. Smits has requested a public announcement regarding the gift of the Bibles and Hymnals to Faith Lutheran's Hispanic Ministry.

<u>Fellowship Report</u>: Robert Scaling reminded Council that the July 4 celebration would begin at 6 p.m. in Luther Hall. Kay Swedberg has posted a sign-up sheet. Faith Lutheran members are invited to join us.

Christian Service and Missions Report: see attached report submitted by Ruth Staffeldt.

<u>Christian Education Report</u>: Dianne Wensel reported that there were four children attending Sunday School on June 14. Vacation Bible School had over 80 children enrolled and an average attendance of 75 children per day. Mary Martin is identifying the unchurched who attended.

Evangelism Report: no report this month.

<u>Day School Board Report</u>: see attached report submitted by Megan Wood. A donation has been received to fund the preschool program for next year. With the anticipated enrollment, we probably will not have classroom assistants next year.

<u>Trustee's Report</u>: Frank Brennan advised that our internet service is going down frequently and Century Link is not restoring service for several hours. To change our service from Century Link to Comcast was reviewed, including cost. We would have to create a new website and email addresses would change for both church and school. A follow-up is needed to determine if Century Link would bill an early leave charge. If the decision is to change our internet provider, a detail plan is necessary to ensure a smooth transition.

RT Electric has completed the lighting in the parking lot and will be working on the driveway and the goal post areas next.

Painting in the church building will begin shortly. Frank and Karen will paint the hallway and the Narthex using an off-white color. Frank plans to hire a professional painter to paint the Sanctuary.

Frank asked that someone determine what needs to stay in the Narthex and hallway. Karen Jensen wants the Youth bulletin board to be in a prominent place. It would include a calendar of events and many photographs from the Youth activities.

The carpeting in the hallway and Narthex is worn in some places, creating a safety hazard, and needs to be replaced. Some would like to replace the carpeting in the Sanctuary at the same time, but others feel the Sanctuary carpet is in better condition and does not require replacement now. Council asked the Trustees to develop a recommendation to be discussed at the Council meeting in September.

In Luther Hall, the light fixture in the hallway by the kitchen will be replaced. The Bunn coffee maker has been replaced.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: see attached report submitted by John Guenther. John reported that general contributions have improved in June. He anticipates that the Net Difference for the fiscal year will be approximately -\$13,000.

Doug Lorenz noted that Council should develop a recommendation for the use of the Rey de Reyes funds to take to the Voters' Assembly.

<u>President's Report</u>: Greg announced that a fall theme is proposed, "Responding to God's Love", to challenge members to come up with ways to incorporate this into the work of the church. He asked us to pray and we will discuss at our next meeting. Greg will email Pastor Carabotta to get his input.

Doug Lorenz suggested that temple talks or bulletin inserts be used to tell the congregation what the Boards do, perhaps two or three each week.

Pastor Carabotta is planning to return the third week of August.

Vice President's Report: nothing new to report this month.

Stewardship Report: no report this month.

<u>Leadership Shield</u>: Greg asked that "Responding to God's Love" and the carpet replacement proposals be included in the Staff/Leadership Prayer Shield, asking for God's guidance. Jill Smith will be undergoing a knee replacement. In addition, thank God for the donation which funds the preschool program next year.

After discussion, Council decided not to meet in July. Our next Council meeting will be August 15, 2017, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Greg led us in prayer and we closed with the Lord's Prayer.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:38 p.m.
